About PCD



The Partnership for Career Development (PCD) has provided student and educator Career Awareness programs for over two decades in South Central PA. PCD's Career Connections Student Events offer time, talent, and funding efficiencies for participating businesses, and schools by gathering all partners at a single time & space, focusing on a particular industry or Career Awareness & Preparation (**CAP**) topic.

In its early years, PCD offered 4 student events, yearly. That number has more than quadrupled, stemming from school and industry demand. PCD now offers 18-20 student career exploration events yearly and the demand grows continuously. PCD serves twenty-two schools, districts, and CTCs in Dauphin, Cumberland, and Perry County – which include some of the very largest districts in PA, and some of the most underserved and rural with CAP programs, events, and initiatives. PCD is proud of the strong school relationships it has developed and sustained, and works tirelessly to find and develop new CAP opportunities for students and staff.

PCD also features, promotes, and supports the efforts of innumerable businesses, training & post-secondary education providers, community groups and more through weekly newsletters, and monthly meetings with school personnel.

The work of Career Awareness & Preparation is an "all hands-on-deck" effort, and PCD's doors are always open to collaborate, convene, and help partners to go further.

Program Development

Three options to get started:

A) An industry/organization/group takes the lead*:

- Secures a location (PCD will provide suggested/best dates/times).
- Locates presenters (PCD has a sign up form we suggest/encourage all presenters to complete).
- Develops sessions, session materials.
- Develops agenda, session rotations, provides opening and closing presentations.

*PCD suggests a strong level of leadership / guidance from program partners to assure relevant sessions are provided and assure session presenters have "buy-in" and investment in the event. PCD can consult for appropriate content, but partner-led session development is strongly encouraged.

B) PCD fully takes the lead:

- PCD reserves a date/time at the centrally located Capital Area Intermediate Unit in Enola.
 PCD typically holds multiple rooms and arranges for technical support, if requested, for those rooms.
- PCD locates presenters from our networks, volunteers, Directors, and partners.
- PCD reserves tables or rooms for presenters presenters are responsible for session content, PCD provides guidance.
- PCD develops the session agenda, session rotation schedule, provides opening and closing presentations.

C) A hybrid of both

PCD respects your time and talent, and can provide just about everything. However, please consider that the program will be more authentic and meaningful with industry partners involved in the development, and on the day.

Your ownership and presence demonstrates your commitment.

However you wish to begin, PCD provides outreach, promotion, registration, and school coordination, engaging with its' comprehensive list of serviced schools in Dauphin, Cumberland, and Perry Counties.



Pro Tip: Does your organization host a "bring your child to work" day? There are likely activities that can be repurposed for Career Connections Events. Treasure hunts, quizzes (with small prizes), make it fun!



Program Formats

The many Career Connections Programs PCD has organized fit one of the following three formats. The session format (#1) is preferred and offers the most interactivity and flexibility for modifications.

PCD has shifted format types, up to the last minute, to accomodate unforseen changes.

Three "Tried & True" Models

Station Rotations

This format works well with either an "Expo-Like" approach, where all activities/presenters are in one room and presenters have tables, or in multiple rooms for a more spacious option.

Students have a fixed amount of time (20 minutes or so) per station for activities, games, discussions, VR, and other presenter activities, then they move to the next station. <image>

There are times when a panel discussion is the best/only option. This requires the least amount of pre-work, and PCD provides engaging panel questions for presenters.

02 Informational Interviews

This format is particularly effective/popular with industries that do not have many "handson" tools or age-appropriate activities for students to explore.

Questions are provided beforehand to presenters, school personnel and students.

Students adopt "roles" to question presenters, and "share out" their findings at the conclusion.

Pro Tip: Prep attending adults with questions to ask during Q&A opportunities.. Students don't like to "be first." Preparing an adult beforehand with a leading question will open the floor for others to follow.
